"It is sometimes hard to let go and understand that even though you can't see where it's going, I can. That's what I'm there for."

Slane says that one of the most satisfying parts of her job is watching the clients when they see their new space for the first time. "It is wonderful when it is all over and they really, really love it and it works and functions the way they want," she says. "That's the best part, when they see what a difference you have made and realize that that's why they hired you."
